Considerable interest in the Com-pany's Assembly Plant was shown by the Prime Minister and all members of his party and many questions were asked and answered, Mr. W. J. Robinson being specially responsible for explaining details to the Prime Minister who was keenly interested in Rover production methods.

The party moved quickly through the various stages and at one point eight senior shop stewards were introduced to Mr. Wilson—Mr. P. Rock (National Union of Vehicle Builders), Mr. M. Kavanagh (Trans-port and General Workers Union), Mr. F. Baron (Amalgamated Union of Engineering and Foundry Workers), Mr. D. H. Martin (General and Mr. D. H. Martin (General and Municipal Workers Union), Mr. J. Gibson (Electrical Trades Union), Mr. B. Masters (Heating and Domestic Engineers Union), Mr. J. 
N.U.V.B.) reported that "the Prime Minister said the Rover Cars in his official fleet could stand up to competition anywhere in the world."





BRITISH DOCTORS AND LAND-ROVERS IN THE SHADOW OF MT. EVEREST

A S reported in the April issue, a British Medical team left London on 17th April, bound for Nepal on a three year research expedition. The project which is organised by the Britain-Nepal Medical Trust Ltd., is under the sponsorship of Her Royal Highness Princess Princep Shah, Chairman of the Nepal Red Cross.

Nepal was chosen for the expedition largely because much of the country has little or no medical facilities and there are only 218 in basic nursing and medical techniques, with the object of incor-porating wholly Nepalese medical staff into the entire system. In addition to research into the most common diseases, the team will also carry out a survey into the contraceptive techniques most suited to isolated communities in Nepal.

Members of the expedition with their fleet of Land-Rovers are seen

in the picture taken in the grounds of Lord Hunt's house in Henley, Middlesex. Taking part in the

Tibet, on the east by Sikkim and Bengal and on the south and west by India. 512 miles long by 70 to 150 miles wide and 54,362 square miles area. The recorded population in 1961 was 9,407,127.

The Northern parts of the State embrace the main range of the Himalayas which include Mt. Everest. Amid the mountains lie many fertile valleys and in the principal valley stands the capital Katmandu. The valleys are inhabited by numerous different hill tribes, mainly



doctors for the 10,000,000 population. The country has a very high inci-dence of active tuberculosis, leprosy, meningitis and enteritis and the team's duties will include research into the incidence and treatment of these diseases.

After the clinic has been in operation for six months it is planned to build a small hospital of six or twelve beds. The team then pro-pose opening small dispensaries in tillages up to three days walk from the base where they will train staff recruited from the local population

NEPAL—Geographical

Nepal is an independent Kingdom occupying the Southern slopes of the Himalayas bounded on the north by

Mongolian; but the dominant race are the Ghurkas and their religions are Buddhism and Hinduism. The hillsides are terraced and the land irrigated. Rice, linseed, tobacco and various cereals and pulses are grown, and the forests contain valuable timber trees. Nepal imports cotton goods and yarn, sugar, salt, spices, petrol, metals, etc. During the 1914-1918 and the 1939-1945 wars, the Nepalese Government rendered unstinted and unconditional assistance to the British Government in men. money and material.


ALVIS APPRENTICES LAUNCH 'SIVLA'

Outpost of Rover Factory Service closes down MANAGER RETIRES

IN 1945, following considerable war damage to its factory at Coventry, the Rover Company announced its decision to move its headquarters and Assembly Plant to Solihull. This move meant of course that the Service Department would also be moving and Rover owners in Coventry area were extremely unset about this area were extremely upset about this because many of them had used the service exclusively and their cars had never been in any other repair garage. Following quite serious pleas, by these customers, to the Rover Directors imploring them to leave a small service depot at Coventry, Mr. Ransom Harrison, chairman of the Company at that time, decided not to let them down. Arrangements were made to set up a small service depot at the Company's premises at Clay Lane, Coventry and Mr. H. Gardner was appointed manager.

For 23 years this little outpost of Rover service has operated in Coven-try and there's little doubt that its success and the high reputation it has earned has been due to the sustained efforts of Mr. Gardner and

The depot, which had recently moved from Clay Lane to the Alvis moved from Clay Lane to the Alvis Service Department at Jobs Lane, Coventry, was officially closed by the Company on 28th June, 1968 and Messrs S. H. Newsome & Co. Ltd., the recently appointed Rover Dis-tributors, are taking over the building and service responsibilities. Following the Company's announcement of this intention, many letters received from intention, many letters received from Coventry customers have carried an appreciation of Mr. Gardner and his


